This is the second of a three part series discussing health topics relevent to older Americans. Part one discussed "keeping healthy." In the third part "staying active" will be discussed. Today we will focus on prevention.

PART TWO – THINK PREVENTION Stop smoking.

Eat Balanced Meals. Experts recommend for the elderly, each day: four or more servings of bread and cereals; two or more servings of meat, poultry, fish, or eggs; four or more servings of fruit and/or vegetables; and two or more cups of milk or its equivalent in dairy products.

Avoid prolonged exposure to heat or cold. Aging bodies are not as resistent to temperature extremes. New findings show that older persons are especially susceptible to accidental hypothermia, a drop in deep body temperature which can be fatal. Those taking any of a group of drugs called phenothiazines are even more vulnerable. To reduce the threat of accidential hypothermia, older persons should keep rooms at 70° F. or higher and should wear adequate clothing for warmth, even if they don't feel particularly cold. Protect yourself against falls. The most common cause of fatal injury in the elderly is falling. Be sure to: Illuminate stairways and provide light switches at both top and bottom.

Provide night-lights or bedside remotecontrolled light switches.

Install sturdy handrails on both sides of stairways.

Tack down carpeting and use non-skid tred.

Arrange furniture so it is not an obstacle. Use grab bars on bathroom walls and non-skid mats or strips in the bathtub.

Keep outdoor steps and walkways in good repair.

When rising from a sitting or lying position, move slowly to prevent faintness or a dizzy feeling.

Prevent burns.

Never smoke in bed or when drowsy.

When cooking, don't wear loosely fitting flammable clothing such as bathrobes, nightgowns or pajamas.

Set water heater thermostats so that water is not hot enough to scald the skin.

Plan what emergency exits to use in case of fire. Avoid multiple door locks which are hard to open in an emergency.

Avoid falling asleep on an electric heating pad set on high.

Use common sense in operating a motor vehicle. Your ability to drive may be limited by age-related changes including sensitivity to glare, poor adaptation to dark, diminshed coordination and slower reaction time. Compensate by driving less often and more slowly. Avoid driving at night, during rush hours and in bad weather.
